STUDY FOR DECEMBER

Luke 24:1 to 25 [from the New Revised Version] a story of the birth of the Messiah

- 18 Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit.
- 19 Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly.
- 20 But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit.
- 21 She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins."
- 22 All this took place to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet:
- 23 "Look, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel," which means, "God is with us."
- 24 When Joseph awoke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him; he took her as his wife,
- 25 But had no marital relations with her until she had borne a son, and he named him Jesus.

Study: Matthew1: 18 - 25

Read again this familiar passage, this time concentrate on Joseph. What was happening in his life? What did he see? Hear? Feel? What was his response?

Vs. 18 – What do we learn of Joseph in this verse?

Vs. 19 – What was Joseph's initial thought? Why?

Vs. 20 – What did he do about his thought in verse 19?

Consider the appearance of the angel. What were the angel's first words to Joseph?

Vs. 20 and 21 – Why did the angel tell Joseph not to fear?

- What do we learn of Jesus in these verses?

Vs. 22 and 23 – What had been the prophecy?

- What is the meaning and significance of the word "Emmanuel"?

Vs. 24 and 25 – What was Joseph's response to the dream?

Consider the part Joseph played in the life of Jesus before and after the birth. What difference does this make for us today? What example does Joseph give for us to follow?

Now try the same exercise, this time focusing on Mary.

O that birth for ever blessed!
When the virgin full of grace,
By the Holy Ghost conceiving,

First revealed his sacred face.

Broken Fall

A number of years ago, a lighthouse was being built on the rock-bound coast of Wales. When the lighthouse was nearly completed, one of the workmen stumbled and fell back through the scaffolding to the rocks below. The other workmen, shocked at what had taken place did not dare to look down, for fear of being unnerved at the sight. Heavy hearted, they backed down the ladders. But to their surprise and joy they saw their fellow workman lying upon a tuft of grass, shaken and shocked, bruised to be sure, but not seriously harmed. Beside him lay a dead lamb. A flock of sheep had been wandering by and a lamb had broken his fall. What a vivid reminder that the True Lamb has broken our fall and has defeated death for every one of us The next day John saw Jesus coming unto him and said, "Behold the Lamb of God which taketh away the sin of the world." John 1:29.

My Reflection

WOW!! What a vivid picture ... How many times have I had a similar experience when something or somebody has broken a fall for me?

This also poses a challenge to me. Am I in tune with God's plan for me when I am being asked to break a fall for a fellow traveler along the road of life? What happens when I consciously decide I do not want to be involved? Or I brush `the thought aside thinking someone else will do it?? I believe that God, through the Holy Spirit, places people on our hearts, and asks us to make a call, write a note, send an email, send a flower, offer a meal, intercede in prayer, or visit. We may not be aware of the need of that person, but God knows and asks us to make the connection,

Once again I find myself reading the Old Testament Book of Jeremiah and am struck with his faithfulness in responding to the task God has given to him of warning the people of God that they are heading for destruction, He is beaten and cast out of their midst as he carries God's message to them, he was God's instrument to break their fall,

God has placed many people in my life and each played a role in my walk with God – parents who set high standards/.family members who offered love and acceptance, to Sunday school teachers, youth group leaders, camp, nursing mentors, NCFC leaders, nursing educators, university professors, special friends, - all have 'broken the fall'. Through their expression of concern, through invitations to be involved in NCFC, through listening to my questions when I was resisting

God's way, by just sitting with me in silence, when the pain was more than I could handle, through the reminders by fellow Christians of my need to stay close to the God who loves me more than I can ever fully understand1 I do not believe it was an accident that they came into my life and led me by example to the Lamb of God! by SAO Oct, 2018
