NCFI World Congress 2024: Blessings & Reflections

The NCFI Congress "The Courage and Strength to Care" was a great experience for me. This was my first opportunity to attend. The experience of having Christ-following nurses in different fields of nursing from around the world come together in one place was phenomenal!

The Congress touched me spiritually, professionally, globally and culturally. I witnessed a tremendous display of God's love and grace. We were able to see and understand how God is using nurses to care for many components of our patients' lives, caring for the vulnerable in every area of their lives, all for His glory. During the Congress I realized how all the missions and visions of the various NCF's are similar to each other and echo that of NCFI. It demonstrated our oneness in Christ. The aim of this Congress which was to create and foster Christ-like relationships among nurses across the world, to strengthen and encourage one another; was indeed manifested.

The daily devotions were in depth, reaching down to the soul, enriching and feeding my spirit. It made the whole Congress which was anchored on evidence-based practice, spirit-filled and Christ honoring. My spirit was renewed every day in this inspiring and Christ centered atmosphere.

I had the privilege of meeting new accomplished nurses and midwives caring for the vulnerable

with love and dedication and sincerity of heart. I made new friends in the Lord, and we shared professional insights and encouraged each other, which I know will continue to grow. I also met those I have only seen on our Zoom meetings and this enriched the experience even more. Meeting Dr. Bob Snyder in person, whom I have only seen on the videos in the Saline Process Witness Training, was also exhilarating.

The Pre-Congress courses were invaluable and very informative, shedding light on our walk with Christ as nurses. In the presentation "The Values Based Teacher: Teaching Like Jesus", what touched my heart is that teaching without



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values makes the foundation very weak. Jesus taught the way He did because of His holy values. My take away: Do your best to be Christlike in all you do and say.

One of the presentations that really caught my attention and resonates with what many organizations like NCFC are challenged with, is "Passing the Baton", by Dr. Linda S. Rieg. She talked about the connection between Christ as our source of caring and as our role model for mentoring others. She likened mentorship with discipleship and what the differences represent for us as we look for successors. Succession is an important and sometimes difficult transition, and worthy of more discussion.

My experience at the NCFI World Congress was extremely profound, and overwhelming; I will do my best to express myself. I am still processing everything that occurred in such a short amount of time. God provided me so many unique opportunities, and it was so nice to meet my fellow Canadians that I had only met previously on Zoom! Worship time was my favorite - to have people from all over the world praising God in unity - it was awesome!

Euthanasia: Even though I knew medical staff in other countries were providing euthanasia to patients, I never realized the extent of similarities other nations had with Canada before in this regard. To hear from Spain that they are also losing the fight for conscience protection in their workplaces was eye opening for me. It appears that there is a world-wide agenda for the accomplishment of many threatening things, which I hadn't truly realized before. For so many years, I had felt such an urgency to fight for issues surrounding sanctity of life in Canada, but sanctity is being attacked on a much larger scale. I met with a nurse from Denmark who reminded me so much of myself eight years ago as she currently faces the possibility that her country may be legalizing euthanasia. She asked me if I would be willing to share my stories regarding euthanasia in Canada with a reporter from Denmark, and of course I said yes.

Meeting Dorice from Quebec was very special. Without realizing it, she helped me to see what God wanted me to discover. Surprisingly this was simply through our practical discussions about similarities in international airports; to Care" resonated with the core practices of a Christian nurse. He spoke about the Covenant of Care which has been a pillar for nursing: "It requires strength and courage to uphold what is unique, absolute and necessary for the continuation of nursing in the future". He also made a statement for us to remember as we provide health care and spiritual care: "Patients are more concerned that we care for them as humans and persons rather than for sickness treatment."

Finally, it was amazing having Christian nurses from all over the world worshipping the Lord in one place, giving us a glimpse of what the new heaven and earth will be like.

and a world-wide perspective on the COVID pandemic.

As I sat down next to Juni, a nurse from Miami, on my first day of the congress, I started to formulate a plan to start a nurses' prayer group at my hospital in southeast Florida moving forward. It is so very important to unite and fellowship together. The nurse at work in the office next to mine, (who happens to be from Quebec), has already told me to count her in!

In one of the concurrent sessions I attended, I received advice to stop publishing in my own country. I was told to send articles to an international journal instead which has greater impact. I'm not sure who said it, but I often think of the following quote, "Your talents are your gift from God, what you do with them is your gift to God." I believe that God has provided me some gifts in writing, and I felt quite encouraged at the conference. I feel that there is something to be said about the current world climate and how to respond as fellow Christians, and with God's help, I will try to say it. This is something I have been thinking about quite a lot and I hope to encourage, prepare, and strengthen others.

The sermon on Psalm 23 was very meaningful to me and provided insights that I had not heard previously regarding this well-known psalm. Just last week, I shared with my Christian patient the words, "The closer you are to the Shepherd, the less fear there is of the wolves." I'm not sure who wrote the quote, but I hope it brought some comfort and direction to my patient regarding the unique situation he had been discussing with me. I feel so extremely blessed to have been able to go to the Congress and am so very thankful to NCF Canada. I will never forget the experience, nor the generosity shown to me. The Plenary and Bible Exposition speakers and sessions were excellent, focusing on finding strength and courage to care from a wholistic paradigm. Panel members were knowledgeable and resourceful. I was impressed by their ability to become appropriately vulnerable as they shared from their own unique lived experiences.

We were given many opportunities to connect and reconnect, including conversations during mealtimes, coffee breaks, concurrent sessions, and even on bus tours. It was inspiring to hear stories of vision and passion, living as Salt & Light; being able to witness to those who are broken and in need of the transforming presence of Jesus.

Finally, a significant highlight for me was the Praise & Worship at the beginning of each Bible Exposition & Plenary session. The selections were contemporary songs of worship to our God. I could sense the presence of our living God, which set the tone for the day.

I left with a renewed sense of vision, strength, and passion. God is at work, and we have the amazing opportunity to join with Him in His kingdom purposes, from a strength-based paradigm, looking to Jesus. Our wonderful, beautiful God is more than enough and completely faithful to His promises.

I have had the privilege of attending 7 NCFI World Congresses since 1988. Canada became a member country in 1992 at the Congress in Fiji. For me, that was a highlight year! There are now over 30 member countries and affiliates in many more. The purpose of NCFI is "to connect Christian nurses around the world, equipping them to live out their faith in professional practice".

As I reflected on how NCFI has impacted me professionally and personally, I thought of these benefits: God-at-work. I experienced the consistent care of the teachers in a small group of nurses from 11 nations. We learned up-to-date professional evidence of the how/where/what of providing and documenting the art and science of spiritual care.

During the Nigerian cultural event, despite my abysmal physical ineptitude, I joined the dancers. I grabbed Mia's hand and pulled her into the throng. We did our best—well, at least, we heartily laughed a lot! Mia attended the NCFI in Chile, too. Her language was much more at home than mine, this time. She shared a dream that one day we might have an NCFI conference in Spain! What a delight when Mia was one of the first people who welcomed Anne Hawes and me when we arrived at the Casa Diocesana in Malaga. A dream come true!

- Excellent Bible teaching that has helped me integrate my faith with my nursing practice. From the 1998 Bible expositor, Eugene Peterson, to Fernando Ramos Pena in 2024, I have learned and grown spiritually, as gifted teachers have opened God's Word and applied it to nursing.

In terms of personal highlights from the World Congress, the activity I drew the most out of was the Saline Process Witness Training Programme. The trainers were incredible! I learned invaluable information on how to share the gospel with permission, with sensitivity and respect. I now feel so much more prepared to start my job as a new nurse.
