Scripture Study – John 15: 1 to 9

I am the true vine, and my Father is the gardener.

Every branch in me that beareth not fruit he taketh away; and every branch that beareth fruit, he purgeth it, that it may bring forth more fruit.

Now ye are clean through the word which I have spoken unto you.

Abide in me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, except it abide in the vine, no more can ye, except ye abide in me.

I am the vine, ye are the branches. He that abideth in me and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit; for without me ye can do nothing.

If a man abide not in me, he is cast forth as a branch, and is withered; and men gather them, and cast them into the fire, and they are burned.

If ye abide in me, and my words abide in you, ye shall ask what ye will, and it shall be done unto you.

In this is my Father glorified, that ye bear much fruit; so shall ye be my disciples. As the Father hath loved me, so have I loved you, continue ye in my love.

This passage has a clear message for each of us – Jesus is relating a story that is important for us to understand and follow.

In the Old Testament, Israel was referred to as a vine. – the vine of God.

Who does Jesus say is the "true vine"? and who is the gardener? What are we?

What does the gardener do? Why does He do this?

How does this apply to us? What does it mean to be purged? Can you think of an example of how you have been Purged?

Jesus speaks of abiding in Him. What does that mean? How do we abide in Jesus? What happens when someone does not abide in Him?

What happens when we do abide in Him?

Note the branches can do nothing of themselves – they can only produce fruit when they are abiding in the vine. All they can do is to hang in there are by so doing receive the nourishment from the vine which will produce the fruit.

What fruit are we producing? Is it an abundance of fruit? What is the result of producing much fruit?

BEFORE OUR MAKER'S THRONE WE POUR OUR ARDENT PRAYERS

"Before our Maker's throne we pour our ardent prayers". This line was part of one of the hymns we sang in church last Sunday.

As we sang these words, I began to think about my prayers and what they would look like if they were placed before the Maker's throne. Would I be able to pour them? Pouring implies that there is a lot of material – in fact an abundance of material would be required to keep the stream going. Would my prayers be able to be poured - or would it just be a sprinkling? Would what should be a river – be diminished to a trickle?

Then I thought about the word "ardent". Ardent means passionate, zealous or intense. Are my prayers like that? Or are they uttered with less intensity and almost routine?

When I think of what my Maker has done for me, and know that He wants me to meet with Him and communicate with Him daily, I feel that my prayer life is lacking in so many ways. The time that I spend with God is a small fraction of the time that I should devote to Him – the ardency of my prayers is less than He deserves. And what about me? I am missing out on the richness of this time – my pathetic attempts at communicating with God are lessening the fullness of grace that could me mine in this precious time.

Yes, all prayer is important and God hears all our prayers – even those that are unuttered but only in our heart. However, I feel that our time of communing with Him should be the most important time of the day and needs to be given our top priority. It is a time when we can pour out our prayers – everything that is in our heart – and sit at His feet feeling His presence and delighting in it. I believe that prayer includes just waiting on God as well as communicating verbally. Sometimes that time of waiting in silence – or centering on our Maker brings a joy and peace that can be found nowhere else.

As we each think about our prayer times, let us approach God with a heart that is open to His leading, a desire to know Him more fully, and a commitment to pour our ardent prayers before His throne.
