STUDY FOR DECEMBER Matthew 2 - 1 to 12 the visit of the Wise Men

- 1 In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem,
- 2 asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed a star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage."
- 3 when King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him;
- 4 and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born.
- 5 They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:
- 6 'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel.'"
- 7 Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared.
- 8 Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage."
- 9 When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising until it stopped over the place where the child was.
- 10 When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy.
- 11 On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.
- 12 and having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

Study: Matthew 2: 1-12

Read again this familiar passage.
What was happening in this passage?
What do you learn about Jesus?
What do you learn about the wise men?

- Vs. 1 -What do we learn of Jesus in this verse?
- Vs. 2 What do we learn of the wise men? What more do we learn about Jesus?
- Vs.3 What do we learn about Herod? Why was he frightened?
- Vs. 4 What did Herod do? Why?
- Vs. 5 and 6 What was Herod told? What had been the prophecy?

 What is the meaning and significance of this prophecy?
- Vs. 7 and 8 What did Herod do then? What did he tell the wise men? Why?
- Vs. 9 and 10 How did the wise men find Jesus? What did they feel?
- Vs. 11 What gifts did they offer to Jesus? What was the significance of these gifts?
- Vs. 12 What did they do after the visit? Why?

Overall, consider the part that the wise men played in the life of Mary and Jesus . What difference does this make for us today? What example do they give for us to follow?

SMILES IN THE NURSING HOME

Once a month I conduct a worship service at a local nursing home. There are usually about 20 that attend but this month [December] there were over 30 and there was a large Christmas tree in the room – so the residents were tightly squeezed in together. Most were in wheelchairs or came with walkers. We sang some of the beautiful Christmas hymns and then I read the scripture about the Birth of Christ. I explained about this great gift that God had given to us. We talked about how Jesus would grow up and after a time of teaching, healing and ministry, how He would die for us so that we could have eternal life. I spoke about what we might give to God this Christmas. I said that I understood how most of them were unable to walk very far or do the things that they might like to do for others. I then talked about how one of the greatest gifts that we could give to God and to others was to show how happy we were for the gift He had given us and to reach out to others with a smile. Suddenly the most wonderful thing happened. Smiles began to appear on faces throughout the room. Soon everyone was smiling at each other and went to lunch in a happy way – the Spirit leading and rejoicing. Praise God for smiles in the nursing home! Can we give that same gift to God this Christmas?

Before that there was snow and for the last two weeks Church has been cancelled because of the weather.
